Fredrick Kawooya, the Policy and Campaigns Manager at ActionAid gave the background to the study, noting that commitment to NAPA was as early as 2007 hence the need to take stock of what has been happening. He arged policy players present to use the study to inform policy tht will ensure a change on ground and improve

The chief guest, Dr Kisambwa Mugerwa who represented the Water and Environment Minister highlighted the need to share and inform the public of what transpired at COP 21 as a way of promoting accountability and enhancing citizen participation, utilization of implications while allowing the localization and contextualization to Uganda. He further noted that although the Paris agreement was a step forward for the African continent, the need for climate financing towards vulnerable countries should not be underestimated as the Agreement is non-binding to those not signatory and therefore provides no guarantee of action.

The meeting was closed with the launch of the NAPA evaluation study report.

These and more, are reminders of how mean nature can be, sometimes. While am in awe of how the city got rebuilt again with speed, a colleague with whom I am having a ride, isn't. She tells me that so much money was injected into the country in the wake of the earthquake but due to rampant corruption, not much was done with it.
