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Okello attended a drama performance about GBV. It never left him the same. At one point, he thought they were acting out his conduct to his wife and children of the past 10 years. On that day, he resolved to stop battering his wife. He also supported her in her brick laying business. They are now happily married, and all their children are in school.

Every 12 minutes, A Woman dies due to GBV-Report!



ActionAid Uganda reports that one of the biggest drivers of GBV is the poor economic status of women. AAU has hence incorporated Women economic empowerment in its services to GBV survivors.

Five women are killed every hour by a partner or family member globally, according to new figures released by ActionAid International last week.

An analysis of a United Nations global crime study has revealed that an estimated **43,600 women are killed** every year by an intimate partner or family member. This is the equivalent to five women every hour or one woman every **12** minutes.

Sarah Carson, Women's Right's Campaigns Manager, at ActionAid UK stated that as a woman, the most com-

mon form of violence you are likely to face is domestic violence. This she said is a horrific symptom of gender inequality.

"With a third of all women experiencing some form of violence in their lifetime, the issue is a global epidemic and one which threatens the lives of millions of women every day, with women living in poverty and those facing other forms of discrimination often at greater risk."

ActionAid also estimates that **over half a million women will die** as a result of domestic violence by 2030. Despite this, almost a quarter of countries in the world still have no laws specifically protecting women from domestic violence.

These findings were launched as part of international development charity ActionAid's new briefing <u>Fearless</u> <u>Women and Girls - leading the way, transforming lives</u> which sets out the critical role women's rights groups play in tackling violence.

The report calls on the Government to commit to boosting the proportion of aid going directly to women's groups working on the frontline. ActionAid is recommending at least **£70 million** over the next three years to be taken from the existing aid budget.

Research from the Association for Women's Rights in Development shows that women's rights' organisations are chronically underfunded, with an estimated average income of just over **£14,000 a year** per year.

Local Context

Violence against Women and girls remains one of the most prevalent human Rights violations in Uganda. The World Bank estimates that one in three women will experience physical or sexual abuse in their life time. ActionAid Uganda is one of the lead agencies in the country working to attain gender equality and women's empowerment and is operating 10 GBV shelters of Gulu,Lira,Amuru, Nebbi, Mubende, Bwaise, Pallisa, Kumi, Kween and Katakwi.

Joyce Nabwire Baker, the Project Coordinator of the DFID funded Women Protection Centres affirms that Gender Based Violence undermines the health, dignity, security and autonomy of its victims and yet it remains shrouded in a culture of silence.

"At the shelters, we receive victims of violence suffering from sexual and reproductive health consequences like unwanted pregnancies, unsafe abortions, fistula, STIs and sometimes death."

Some of the services offered include psychosocial assistance, medical treatment, legal advice, conflict mediation and economic empowerment to GBV survivors. Joyce notes that one of the biggest drivers of GBV in Uganda is the poor economic status of women. The centres have hence integrated economic empowerment in its makeup.

"We have to date equipped over 1000 women with skills in catering, tailoring, Poultry breeding and hair dressing. These women are now running businesses as individuals or in groups."

AAU has proved that economic empowerment is a driver out of GBV. As we commemorate international Womens day tomorrow, we call upon you to support the women in their lives to attain economic empowerment.

DGF Seeks learning from AAU

The team came to learn from ActionAid how it incorporates the livelihoods aspect in its programming. Sophie, the component Manager of Access to Justice at DGF commended ActionAid for the great job its doing in the community.

"We received very impressive feedback from the consultants who recently conducted an evaluation of all our partners and the work they do. ActionAid is doing a great job. We are here to learn from you", she said.

Sophie also noted that while DGF funds several CSOs to provide legal aid services in various parts of the country, they have not realised a reduction in the powerlessness and vulnerability of the legal aid clients.

Nabwire Joyce Baker, the coordinator of the Women Protection Centres stated that its for the same reason that Action-Aid incorporated Economic empowerment and a focus on livelihoods in its programing.

"In our patriarchal society, you cannot realize empowerment especially of women if you don't address their economic needs. We conduct an assessment of all our clients, identify business ideas of interest and equip them with basic skills and a start up package."

Joyce added that the women then operate the businesses in groups or individually and this has transformed them into powerful women, standing up against GBV.
