ActionAid has learnt that about 2,000 artisanal gold miners were last night still stranded at mining sites in Kitumbi in Bukuya Sub-county, Mubende District following their eviction on Friday by the police and army.

The media reports indicate that many of those that have remained at the mines are Rwandese and Congolese.

Last Friday, security forces commanded by Col Joseph Balikuddembe, the UPDF 1st Division commander, descended on and ordered the gold miners to leave within two hours. Those from neighbouring districts such as Mityana, Sembabule and Wakiso swiftly packed their belongings and departed. Others stared in disbelief and confusion as armed police and soldiers charged on them and hollered orders.

Energy and Mineral Development Ministry officials stated during media interviews that the miners were making money without paying taxes and, as such, deprived the government of revenue hence the evictions.

However, the Policy and Campaigns Manager at ActionAid, Fredrick Kawooya told the weekly that the policy on mining recognises artisanal miners and no country has registered growth in its mining sector without the role of artisanal miners. Fred added that Government was aware of the mining activities in the area and asked the miners to apply for a licence. Unfortunately, the licence was never granted.

"What is saddening is the fact that the letter written by the Permanent Secretary to the miners stated that Government intended to conduct a registration process of all miners. It had nothing to do with evictions and yet the same letter was used by the forces to issue a two hour eviction notice. This is unfortunate and ActionAid vehemently denounces it," he said.

Mr Bukenya, a politician in the area also questioned Government's lack of transparency and inconsistencies. "I smell a rat in this whole process. If their (ministry officials') intention is to register them, where will they find them after the eviction?" he said.

The Extractives Governance Officer at ActionAid, Nalubega Flavia has said that their unit planning to have what she calls a mega media campaign to speak against this demonic, barbaric injustice against humanity.

ActionAid and other CSOs have placed a legal team on ground to ensure that all those that were arrested for resisting the eviction are either released or decongested to avoid health complications that could arise as a result of the congestion. The team is also preparing to petition the Attorney General for wrongful evictions and seeking compensation for the miners.

Youth register wins on Paper-as they wait for Action

As the curtain drew on the week-long 9th Commonwealth Youth Ministers Meeting in Kampala, 20 ministers from the member states committed to resolve the myriad of challenges that youths within the Commonwealth face. Secretary general of the Commonwealth, Patricia Scotland stated that the ministers, during a closed meeting, unanimously agreed that youths are critical to national development.

"They pledged to redouble their efforts to mobilise adequate financing and resourcing for youth development and resolved to take concrete action to empower and address the specific needs of the marginalized young people," she said.

The ministers also committed to improve young people's access to health services and agreed to support their need for participation in national decision making institutions.

The meeting which is held once in four years was supported by ActionAid through the Uganda Youth Parliamentary Forum. It attracted a delegation of stakeholders and youth leaders from 32 countries.

ActionAid's Youth Advisor, Grace Ruvimbo stated during the meeting that Gender inequality remains a major concern across the commonwealth countries. "Patriarchal tendencies still define the roles of young people across the development agenda and have a pullback effect on the enhancement of their rights", she said.

Grace added that the effect of such notions is retrogressive in the advancement of young people's economic, social, political and technological well being.

The Ministers committed to design Policies and programmes with this reality in mind and with specific gender targets attached to them to ensure equity and equality of the sexes in the long-term aspects of the financing of youth development.

Other issues such as investing in youths, impact of conflicts on youth and youth financing, were discussed under the theme, *Resourcing and financing* youth development: empowering young people. The Ministers committed to increased and sustained investments in youth development. They also promised to prioritise investment in post-primary education, productive employment and skills development of the youth.

The ministers also stressed the need to adopt youth-sensitive budgeting, progressive taxation and youth-friendly public procurement policies. They also agreed to encourage the private sector to take steps to address the skills gap and provide more apprenticeships and decent entry level jobs for youths.

Other commitments made include creation of an enabling environment for youth-friendly innovative financial instruments and create policies and strategies to promote youth access to affordable trade finance and support from the banking sector. It remains to be seen if the Governments will live up to these commitments.

"We have highlighted several cases of corruption. We should also highlight the cases of integrity", she guided.

The guests also introduced several creative concepts to AAU for possible further development and rollout.
