POLICE SIEGE AT NGO OFFICES POLICE RAIDS ACTION AID, GLISS OFFICES In a press statement released, Police said ActionAid Uganda and Great Lakes Institute of Strategic Studies (GLISS) possibly received funding from foreign elements to facilitate the protests.
