John Kabanda, a teacher at Nakasero primary school won the just concluded Competition that sought for teachers making education safe for the girl child.

"Am very excited about my win. For the past 10 years, I have been conducting several activities to make the learning environment safe for the girls. Finally, I have been recognised. I will retire a happy man", said John, who has been teaching since 1994.

John stood out when he highlighted on National Radio(CBS FM) how the gaps in the Education system were responsible for violence in schools. He said that most schools don't have female teachers to support the girls.

"There should actually be a criteria for selecting a senior woman teacher. She should have a qualification in guidance and counselling and an allowance to motivate her in nurturing the girls", he said.

The first runner up of the day was Nandutu Betty from Buganda Road Primary school. She pointed out that if a girl gets pregnant in school, she would focus of the girls future and safety.

"While pregnancy is just nine months, her future is in years. I will ensure that this girl sits for her primary leaving exams as well as working with children Organisations to get for her a safe place to stay."

She criticised the situation in schools where girls who get pregnant are paraded for shame and later sent out of school.

Mugerwa Charles Lwanga of Mutundwe Parents school came 3rd.

The best three teachers will take home their cash prizes at a grand event while all the five finalists will be part of an advocacy documentary and safe Education ambassadors to preach the message of making education safe in their entire country.

Did you know that the 85 richest people in the world own more than what the poorest half of the world population have? A study by the world bank confirms this statistic, adding that the 10 richest African families own more than the bottom half of the continent.

Ben Phillips, the Director of Policy and Campaigns at ActionAid international, while speaking to the Weekly confirmed this very unfortunate statistic on inequality. He added that the world inequality gaps have reached crazy proportions, the worst that has been registered in the last 100 years.

This is an eye opener about the predicament that the entire half and its human population face right now. Mother earth's natural resources have been over stretched to make a few of her children richer as the bulk of her sons and daughters get deprived and continue to live in poverty. Uganda is no exceptional.

Magaret Kakande, from the Ministry of Finance totally agrees that the inequality gap in Uganda is growing.

"The Government has put in place several programs like the affirmative action to reduce Gender inequality, and several programs in Northern Uganda to reduce the Regional inequality. However, the effectiveness of these programs is what we should be concerned with if we are to reduce inequality."

At a CSO leaders meeting Organised by ActionAid last week at Hotel Africana, the leaders agreed to form a working group that will plan and strategize to address inequality in the country. The meeting was attended by the office heads of ActionAid Uganda, SEATINI, Uganda National NGO Forum, Uganda Debt Network among others. Jenny Rick, the ActionAid Inequality Coordinator was also present.

Ben and Jenny were also hosted on KFM Hot seat on Thursday. They were joined by Dr Fred Muhumuza of the Financial deepening and inclusion program and Fredrick Kawooya, the Policy and Campaigns Manager at ActionAid. The entire crew agreed to the fact that inequality is becoming a state of emergency and should be addressed immediately both globally and in the country. Look out for the inequality campaign and join the campaign against this injustice.
