Heated, Lively Debate at the People's Parliament

It was a heated, lively, stalemated and sterile debate as the Members of the People's parliament debated the Biotechnology and Biosafety Bill 2012. The People's Parliament is a show on NTV Uganda that gives ordinary citizens a chance to debate issues that are pertinent to every day lives. The show takes a form of a mock Parliament with opposers and proposers of a motion moderated by the Speaker.

ActionAid and its partners under the Food Rights Alliance (FRA) demanded for a re-draft of the bill to include clauses that protect Ugandans against being exposed to Genetically Improved Organisms (GMO) while the proposers want the bill passed in its current form.

"We want a law which has clauses related to labelling of GMO products on the market because not all Ugandan are interested in consuming GMOs. The Biotechnology Bill 2012 does not provide for Labelling of GMO products which contradicts the international provisions Uganda is signatory to", stated AAU's Fred Kawooya-The Policy and Campaigns Manager.

Agnes Kirabo, the Coordinator of FRA added that the committee which approves Biotechnology Researches geared at introducing GMOs in Uganda is composed of Scientists who are participating in the on-going GMOs research which she said, is a conflict of interest because majority of the stakeholder (small scale farmers) are not represented on such committees

mittees.

While the proposing team from the National Agriculture Research Organisation (NARO) advanced that Genetically Engineered products will help the country in improving food and cash crop production, this was dismissed by the opposers who stated that growing GMO crops in the country will increase the cost of doing agriculture because GMO crops require much application of insect and pesticide as well as fertilizers while the scientists in the house added that the technology is not environmentally friendly.

During the debate, it became glaringly clear that the current bill which the 9th Parliament refused to pass has many loopholes because it doesn't protect Ugandans against GMOs and in addition ,farmers are not represented on the National Biotechnology Committee.

"We find it troubling that a country which is fourth in the production of organic foods in the world and first in Africa opts for the unknown. Instead of opening Uganda to GMOs, we urge policy makers to support small famers, such the families to improve on food production by supporting them with quality Agricultural inputs" stated Dr. Giregon Olupot of Makerere University's College of Agriculture and Environmental Sciences.

Dr Peter, a specialists in adult diseases pointed out that unfortunately, the non of the people proposing the Bill in its current form is mandated to even prescribe a pain killer. He said that most of the adult diseases they treat at the National Referral Hospital are a result of what people eat.

"Have you ever wondered why organic foods in the Developed Countries are only affordable to the rich? We must take precaution to protect our organic foods and our health", he appealed.

Since the tabling of the Bill in the Parliament, Ugandan scientists have been conducting GMO crops trials especially for crops such as Cotton , maize, Cassava but such crops cannot be released for commercialization before the legislators pass laws which regulates the application of the technology.

It was a shame when NARO denied conducting GMO crop trials on Cotton in Serere, only to change statement and claim that they are not mandated to speak for NARO when AAU presented them with evidence to that effect.

To prepare the youth for advocacy in the complex and shrinking political space, they were taken through practical learning activities on the principles of leadership, creativity in campaigns, planning, critical thinking, cultivating team spirit and social cohesion.

At the end of the meeting, the youth organized themselves into the Northern Uganda Community Monitors and Activista Association with the vision of building a strong movement of the youth to lead a campaign against the persistent challenges that the region has faced in the past two decades for the desired socio-economic and political reforms.

The group went ahead to elect a seven member executive committee. Their first task will be to map out all youth groups

Participatory tools are being heavily used in the ongoing nationwide Participatory Review and Reflection Processes (PRRPs), an important tradition the organization uses to engender the active involvement of people living in poverty, other stakeholders, including Local Government to provide honest feedback about our work, hold us accountable to our promises and together plan for the future.

This year's PRRPs are unique in the sense that they are being used to inform both ActionAid Uganda and the Global Strategy. In addition to the usual feedback and mutual accountability, AAU is generating a wide range of community priorities that can be used to shape the future direction of ActionAid Uganda and globally.

In Pallisa ,ordinary women have demonstrated extraordinary courage, confidence and clarity in providing feedback to ActionAid and identifying

priorities for the future.

Using a series of tools such as the Community River of Life, the Pairwise Ranking and Body Map, women living in poverty have shown the structural obstacles to their full emancipation. While using the Body Map, they were able to show the use of each and every body part and the rights violations that they attract - they demonstrated why they fight to have control over their bodies, they showed us how the works of their hands and bodies are so important for society but not valued or recognized. They demonstrated the burden of care work, the denial of basic rights and demanded that these must remain priorities in the next strategy.

The PRRPs continue this week in Northern Uganda and West Nile.
